- Loves to bake, hike, visit National Parks (picture to the right from Bryce Canyon), and try new restaurants




# Ashley Han, MD (Third Year Pulmonary Fellow)

- Enjoys Family time, movies, walks, farmers markets, animals, eating different cuisine's, baseball games and traveling




# Jonathan Cogen, MD, MPH Program Director, Pulmonary Fellowship

Fellows can attend (and should!) all clinics during their three years of fellowship to gain exposure to a breath of pediatric pulmonary conditions

# **Clinical Training**

#### Year 1 Inpatient Activities (see objectives in fellowship curriculum)

- 14-18 weeks of inpatient or consult service- most do 16 weeks in 1-week blocks
  - Mixture of TEAM 4 Pulm Service and two separate PULM Consult Services
    - Consult 1 (primarily ICUs), Consult 2 (primarily wards/ER/outside calls)
    - PULM Service Fellow covers weekend for both Service and Consult teams
  - Night Call (VERY unique aspect of our fellowship):
    - Weekend PM call by service fellow/attending
    - Weekday PM call from 7 PM-7 AM each night by "off-service" colleagues (Mon-Fri)
    - Year 1 Fellows included in Weekday PM night call pool starting in ~ January of Year 1
    - This systems provides time off (pager-free!) overnight while working on-service
- 2-week rotation on introduction to Ventilators/Respiratory Therapists (no PM call)
  - Focus on learning ventilator modes/set-up on lung model, shadow senior RTs in ICU/Ward
- 2-week Cardiology Consult Service Rotation (no PM call)
  - Focus on cardiopulmonary interactions and care of children with complex congenital heart disease

# **Clinical Training**

#### Year 1 Outpatient Activities

- •4 weeks of SLEEP Medicine (may be divided into 2 twoweek blocks)
- •½ Day/Week of continuity clinic when not on inpatient service
- •Minimum of ½ Day/Week of Sub-Subspecialty Pulmonary Clinics when not on service
  - •List of clinics: neuromuscular, trach/vent, CF, pulmonary HTN, spine, aerodigestive, congenital diaphragmatic hernia/lung hypoplasia, BPD, primary ciliary dyskinesia, sleep medicine, multidisciplinary sickle cell clinic
  - •Schedule 1 week in advance on Fellows Calendar
- •Outreach Clinics (e.g., Alaska, Wenatchee)- exposure at least once over 3 years
- •Regional Clinics (e.g., Bellevue, Everett, Federal Way)exposure at least once a year

# Flexible Bronchoscopy Training (Years 1-3)

- Hands-on bronchoscopy simulation training during orientation with bronchoscopy director Dr. Matt Abts
- Opportunities to perform bronchoscopies:

   While on TEAM 4 and Consult services
   Block aerodigestive OR days (at least once weekly)
   for "triple-scopes" (pulmonary, OTO, and GI)
- Become proficient in performing sleep endoscopy, bronchoscopy with bronchoalveolar lavage, and tracheoscopy
- Attend complex airway multidisciplinary case conference (twice/month) to discuss complicated cases with general/thoracic surgeons, OTO, and pulmonary radiologists

# Clinical Training (Years 2 and 3)

- Inpatient Rotations: 8 weeks/year (mixture of service and consult services)
  - May do additional weeks in Years 2 and/or 3 per fellow interest
- Outpatient Rotations:
  - 1/2 day continuity clinic/week when off-service
  - Minimum of 1-2 sub-specialty clinics/month when off-service
  - Individualized exposure to additional outreach and regional clinics



# Clinical Conferences/Meetings (Years 1-3)

- Journal Club (or Intermittent Works in Progress)
  - Weekly: Fellow's present ~ once every other month (4-5 for first-year, 2-3 for second/third years)
- Radiology/Pathology Conference
  - Monthly with Drs. Otjen, Romberg and Deutsch-Year 1 fellows lead case introductions
- Pulmonary Physiology Discussion Group
  - Core physiology syllabus for curriculum (meets 1-2 times/month)
  - Mixture of didactic sessions and cases
- Pulmonary Function Testing (PFT) Interpretation Curriculum
- Western States Clinical Conference
  - Monthly teleconference with ~ 10 programs, Year 1 fellows present x 1
- Divisional Meetings- weekly with varied topics
- Complex pulmonary case conference-meets weekly
- Fellows College Curriculum
- Pediatric Pulmonary Center Curriculum
- Individual research meetings with colleagues and mentors

# Teaching/Didactics

- Fellowship Education Committee (PD, APD, two senior fellows)
  - On-boarding education, lectures, list of key papers/reviews/guidelines of care
- Fellows as Teachers
  - Case-based teaching during inpatient team rounds
  - Case-based teaching for elective residents and students
  - Chalk-Talks during inpatient rotations (1-2 times/week on service)
  - Lectures to Pulm Nurse Practitioners and Respiratory Therapists
  - Journal Club/Works in Progress talks
  - Oral or Poster Presentations at Regional or National Meetings
  - Fellows participate in a regional problem-based learning curriculum with fellows from other programs on the West Coast
- Lectures for Fellows
  - Journal Club/Works in Progress talks by Faculty
  - Fellows core lecture series- twice a month

### **Conference** Attendance

- <u>Dedicated funding available</u> for fellows to travel to at least one conference per year
- Fellows are encouraged to submit abstracts describing their research

# Tracking-Arghhh!

- ACGME requires fellows logging weekly duty hours by activity
  - Becca will work with you on this
  - One goal is to ensure no work hour violations
  - Use Med Hub database
- Keep Flexible Bronchoscopy Log
- Keep Weekly Cores Sign-out Sheets to evaluate breadth of clinical exposure and expose areas of deficiency/focus for future
  - See ACGME clinical areas of focus in Peds Pulm Curriculum,
  - Kept on Shared Pulmonary Drive

## Research (The Discovery is FUN!)

- Identify area of interest in first 6 months
  - Basic, translational, clinical, QI are all available
  - Meet with Program Directors and Specific Faculty to identify focus area
  - We can guide you to non-divisional faculty
- For those with interest in Clinical Research (recommend additional coursework):
  - MS or MPH Program at UW with application due in December of Year 1 (60 credits)
  - Maternal Child Health Certificate at UW (15 credits) or Biostatistics Certificate
  - Auditing of specific courses in biostatistics and epidemiology
- Formulate Scholarship Oversight Committee/Identify Mentors by the end of Year 1
  - At least 3 voting members, Program Director or Associate Program Director is Ad Hoc
  - At least 1 voting member must be from outside the Division
- At minimum, complete ABP-approved Scholarly Work Product to be eligible to take "the boards"
  - Master's Thesis, Peer-reviewed publication with significant role, Extramural grant award, unpublished progress report for complex project (see ABP website)

  - Officially twice yearly by Faculty, yearly by other disciplines
  - 6 ACGME competencies from novice to expert (1-5)
  - Additional pulmonary specific measures (e.g., physiology, bronchoscopy)
  - Clinical Competency Committee reviews scores and comments; makes recommendations on progress/goals
  - Annual In-Site Peds Pulm Practice Sub-Board Exams
  - Review strengths and weaknesses from exam scores
- Program Evaluation by Fellows and Faculty
  - Annual review meeting of all rotations and meetings to improve curriculum
  - Fellows to evaluate Faculty and Program annually
  - Program Executive Committee Annual Meeting
  - Fellow Education Committee (Cogen, Gibson, 3<sup>rd</sup> Yr Fellows)


